The tavern is renowned for its sunset views, and it is the only licensed venue in the region accessible by road to witness the sunsetting over the gulf.



The Sunset Tavern comprises of a Main Bar and Bistro, Alfresco Dining Area and Verandah, Beer Garden, Gaming Room including TAB & Keno and On-site Bottleshop.



Karumba Point and Karumba are 8km apart by road, but only half that distance by foot when you take a special walking path created between the two settlements. This 4km walk is very popular with visitors and takes you past mangrove landscape where you can often see a variety of fish, plants and birdlife. You don't even get your feet wet, because bridges have been constructed at the creek crossings. People like to do the walk then relax over a coffee or a meal before setting off on their return journey.



The real attraction is the fishing.

If you have your own boat, you'll find ramps at Karumba and Karumba Point. Otherwise, tour operators take fishing trips. If you're not keen on fishing, you can still have a wonderful time out on the water with a sunset cruise on the Gulf or a birdwatching and wildlife cruise along the river.

In December 1943, American servicemen from the 22nd Bomb Group passed through Ingham, stopped at the **Day Dawn Hotel**, now known as **Lees Hotel**, overnight and drank all the beer. The following day **Dan Sheahan rode his horse 30 kilometres to the hotel only to learn there was no beer**. He had a glass of wine instead, sat in the pub and wrote the poem.



Looking for adventure?

Take a day trip out to Wallaman Falls and **experience the highest, permanent, single drop waterfall in Australia**. Wallaman Falls is part of the Wet Tropics World Heritage Area, which is **home to some of the oldest rainforests on earth**. The creeks and rivers are home to **platypus, eastern water dragons and saw-shelled turtles**. You may even catch a glimpse of a **musky rat-kangaroo** or an **endangered southern cassowary**.



TYTO Wetlands, a **120-hectare rehabilitated wetland area**, home to unique flora and fauna including **over 240 species of birds** (27.4% of Australia's bird species in one location) and many **Agile Wallabies**. With extensive walking tracks, bird hides and viewing platforms, it is a **great way to get up close and personal to wildlife** with the most rewarding experiences found in the early morning or late afternoon.

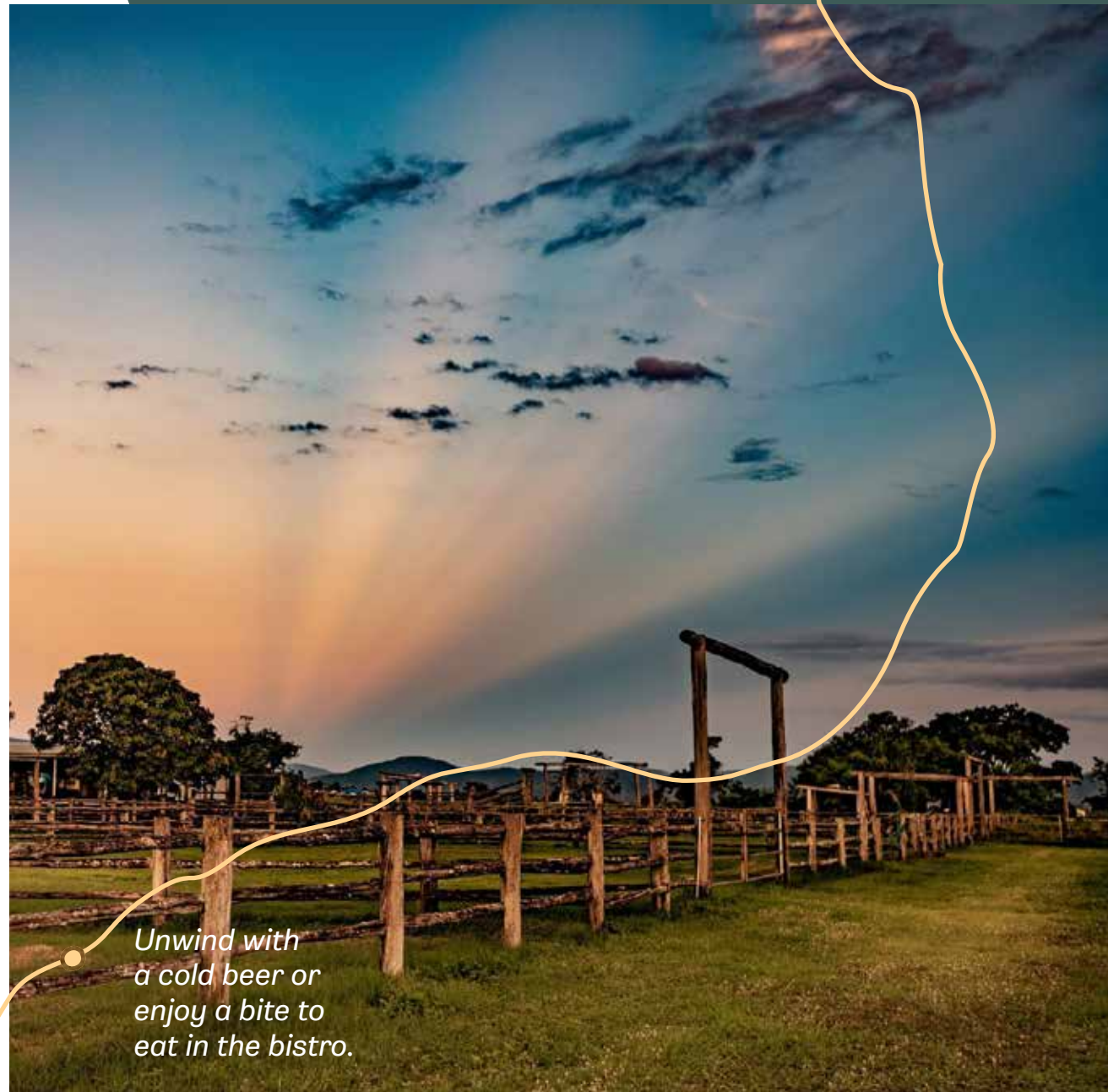

The Blackdown Tableland National Park is a little gem. This sandstone plateau boasts colourful wildlife, spectacular views and a range of nature-based activities. **The walking tracks will take you to the park's heritage sites, creeks and waterfalls.** Alternatively, complete a scenic drive around the park in a four-wheel-drive and find a spot to camp.



If you cannot get enough of fishing and want to try another local hotspot, check out Teresa Creek Dam.

It is described as an oasis in the outback. It is a perfect dam for those that like **swimming, canoeing, water skiing, fishing or just relaxing** and watching time pass you by.

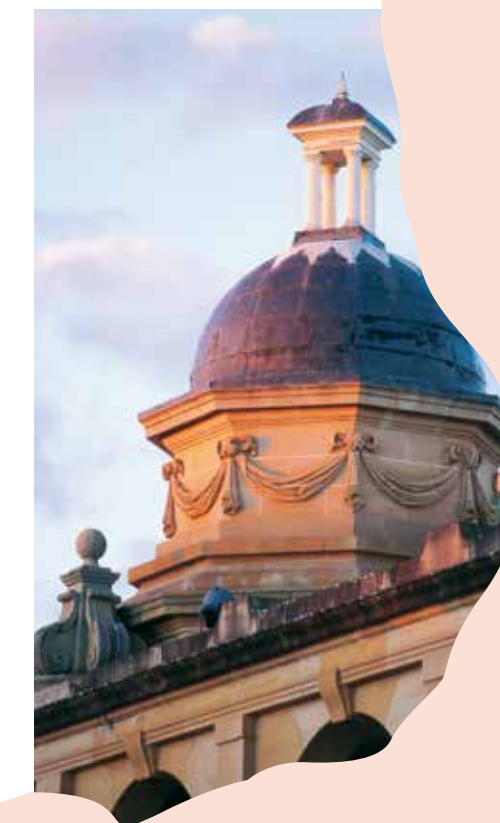
